Day 1 - Ellis Island, Statue of Liberty, & Times Square

Ellis Island. Enjoy a Universal Audio Tour included with your ferry ride. On **Liberty Island**, the 30 minute audio tour explores the history of the Statue of Liberty and its importance as a symbol of freedom and opportunity around the world. See the Registry Room, the historic Great Hall, once filled with new arrivals waiting to be inspected and registered by Immigration officers, now contains historic benches and reproduction inspector desks. Visitors can re-live the experience of 12 million people food court. Located in New York Harbor, the Statue of Liberty was a gift of international friendship from the people of France to the people of the United States and is one of the most universal symbols of political freedom and democracy. Day 2 - 9/11 Memorial, Chinatown, & Broadway Show

Enjoy breakfast included at your hotel prior to departing. Tour the National September 11 Memorial and Museum. This hallowed site serves as the country's principal institution for examining the implications of the events of 9/11, documenting the impact of those events, and exploring the continuing significance of September 11, 2001. A spiral staircase and interactive artwork by Thomas Heatherwick and Heatherwick Studio can be used as a focal point where people enjoy new perspectives of the city and one another from different heights, angles, and vantage points. Visit and walk the High Line, a public park built on a historic freight rail line elevated above the streets on Manhattan's West Side. Saved from demolition by neighborhood residents and the City of New York, the High Line opened in 2009 as a hybrid public space where visitors experience nature, art, and design. Enjoy dinner included this evening prior to a Broadway Show! (Meals: B, L, D)

Day 3 - Central Park & Harlem Tour

Enjoy breakfast included at your hotel this morning. Enjoy a walking tour of the most famous city park in America - Central Park. Covering 6% of Manhattan, this municipal space covers 843 acres, and stretches from Central Park South (59th St.) to 110th St. at the northern end and from 5th Ave. on the East Side to Central Park West (8th Ave.) on the West Side. Depart for Grant's Tomb. Overlooking the Hudson River from the Morningside Heights section of Manhattan, General Grant National Memorial is the largest tomb in North America. Tour Saint John of the Divine Cathedral, the world's largest Gothic cathedral. Discover soaring stonework and brilliant stained glass windows in the Cathedral's bustling nave and serene chapels. Learn about the history of this great sacred today in Manhattan's Chinatown, a neighborhood in Lower Manhattan, space from 1892 to the present, and hear about its many social, cultural,







Tour. In the neighborhood's golden age in the 1920s and 30s, Harlem was the heart of black culture in the United States. Hard economic times hit Harlem during the Depression and continued through the 1980s. Drive by the Apollo Theatre. Ella Fitzgerald, Sarah Vaughan, Billie Holiday, Sammy Davis Jr., James Brown, Gladys Knight, Luther Vandross, D'Angelo, Lauryn Hill, and countless others began their road to stardom on the Apollo stage. Drive by the Duke Ellington Memorial, a pulpit-like form that stands 30 feet, on three tall columns. Atop each column stand three female figures that represent the muses. With their arms raised, the nine muses hold aloft a circular platform, bearing an 8-foot high standing figure of Duke Ellington beside a piano. Drive by the Big Apple Jazz Center and the Cotton Club. The Cotton Club was a New York City night club located first in the Harlem neighborhood on 142nd Street and Lenox Avenue from 1923 to 1935 and then for a brief period from 1936 to 1940 in the midtown Theater District. The club operated most notably during America's Prohibition Era and was a whites-only establishment even though it featured many of the most popular black entertainers of the era, including musicians Cab Calloway, Fletcher Henderson, Duke Elling-

and educational programs. Day 4 - NBC Studios, Radio City, Rockefeller Center, & Depart

Learn the secrets of the Great Stage, one of the largest indoor performance stages in the world, and see a video presentation of the stage's landmark Hydraulic System, that has been in operation since the '30s, and view the Artist Autograph Book signed by the biggest names in show business. Visit and walk around Rockefeller Center, a large complex consisting of 19 high-rise commercial buildings covering 22 acres between 48th and 51st Streets in New York City. Commissioned by the Rockefeller family, it is located in the center of Midtown Manhattan, spanning the area between Fifth Avenue and Sixth Avenue. Rockefeller Center is New York City's historic landmark for dining and shopping in Midtown Manhattan. Enjoy lunch included then depart for home. (Meals: B, L)
